Putting Your Money to Work

These are challenging times. The recession has had an impact on each of us, whether it's job loss, rising costs of goods and services, or helping the homeless. Making the decision to invest in the arts may be difficult amidst all of this, but the question is, can we really afford not to?

Last June, the NC Department of Commerce conducted a study of our state's cultural industries and reported they sustain over \$10 billion of employee compensation, greater than 4.9% of the state's total wages and benefits. Our cultural industries sustain more than 293,000 jobs statewide and produce more than \$41.4 billion in goods and services – nearly 6% of our state's total production.¹

What does it all mean?

The Arts have a role in our economic development – and they help to prepare our students for the 21st century workforce. The arts can restore and revitalize our community, improve the quality of our lives, and make a significant contribution to making Greensboro attractive and desirable to knowledge-based employees (and the companies that hire them).

A solid return on your investment

At the United Arts Council of Greater Greensboro we understand the affect our work has on our economy. Consider how your donations are spent. In 2009, 90% of our expenses went back into our local

economy through three grant programs (\$965,955) and community services (\$388,213). The remaining 10% was used to cover administrative costs (see page 11).

On the surface, this may not seem like a huge contribution, until you consider the number of jobs (1,094) and the amount of revenue (\$1.3 million for local and \$1.5 for State government) and household incomes (\$19.7 million) that are generated by investing in our creative community.²

Through our investments, we foster arts in education which yields a long-term return by preparing our youth for jobs of the future. According to the National Governor's

Association, "Schooling in the arts has cognitive effects that help prepare students for the 21st century workforce. Arts programs combine academic and work-force development skills in a manner attractive to participants of all age groups and economic backgrounds...[providing] students the skills

they need to be productive participants in today's economy."

At the UAC, we put your money to work. We hope you enjoy this issue of Artifact and that you'll share it with someone who shares your interest of improving our community. Thanks to your continued support, Art works for Greensboro.

A Message From Our Board Chair

We've been very busy at the United Arts Council since our last issue of Artifact. In October, we held an annual meeting to report on 2009 accomplishments and to give you an overview of our initiatives for 2010. We presented our annual report (see page 11), the Betty Cone Medal of Arts Award and the Al Jones Volunteer of the Year Award. Our Teacher Art Grant applications were also due in October and we received more applications than ever – 37 total. We were pleased to award funds to eight schools in Guilford County (see page 4).

In November, we held the annual Vanguard Celebration to thank our donors who contribute \$250 or more. This year's festivities included performances from a few of our grant recipients and presentation of the Vanguard Society Award (see page 9). As November closed, we said goodbye to long-time UAC President and CEO Jeanie Duncan and launched a nation-wide search for her successor. Director of Marketing and Community Affairs, Altina Layman, was appointed Interim President /CEO and Tim Goetz joined the UAC as our 2010 Campaign Manager.

The holidays in Greensboro were dominated by holiday performances from our creative community! Festival of Lights and First Friday saw the largest crowd ever, drawing nearly 6,000 to downtown Greensboro (see page 5).

Our annual campaign to raise support for the arts kicked off on January 19 with the event Art Works at the Cultural Arts Center. We were pleased to present local artists Jim Gallucci, Charlotte Hamlin and Josephus Thompson III to tell their stories of how your investment made a difference in their lives and careers (see page 3).

And despite the cold weather and snow in February, 46 artists submitted applications for our Regional Artists Grants, a partnership between the UAC and 4 neighboring county arts councils to support individual artists in our region. These awards will be announced in April.

As Chair of the United Arts Council Board of Directors, I want to personally thank you for the contribution you make to Greensboro through the UAC. Your annual support provides critical funds to many of Greensboro's arts organizations, helps individual artists propel their careers forward, and assists our local teachers with bringing the arts into the classroom. Your gift also provides valuable community services that improves the quality of our lives – through the online community calendar at www.GoTriadSCENE.com, marketing and promotion of our arts and cultural events, First Fridays in downtown Greensboro, advocacy for arts in education at the state and local levels, and as a community resource for arts and culture information.

Thank you for making a difference and investing in our creative community. I look forward to seeing you out, experiencing the arts! ■

United Arts Council Aims To Raise \$1.43 Million for the Arts

On January 19, the UAC launched the 2010 fund drive to raise \$1.43 million by June 30. As of February 28, we've raised \$632,449 toward our goal and the campaign is going strong.

This year's Campaign Chair is UAC Board Member, Nancy Radtke of Allen Tate Realtors. Radtke, along with UAC Campaign Manager, Tim Goetz, have assembled a strong core of volunteers to personally reach out to donors.

"We're excited about this year's campaign and confident we can meet our goal," said Radtke. Kickoff guest speakers included Jim Gallucci, Charlotte Hamlin and Josephus Thompson III, who shared their stories of how art works.

Almost 20 years ago, local sculptor Jim Gallucci received a \$400 grant from the United Arts Council to help build a trailer to transport his metal sculptures to shows across the US. "That grant helped me at a real difficult time," Gallucci said, helping him to reach his current success, with his most recent and largest project to date, the Oak Leaf Light Towers in Raleigh's City Plaza - a \$2.29 million project. Art works for Gallucci, providing for his family, employing five to six in his Greensboro studio,

and using local suppliers and companies to complete his works of art. At the UAC kickoff, Gallucci wanted to give back to the arts and jump-start another artist into a wonderful career with a \$624.27 donation - the original \$400 grant plus interest.

Charlotte Hamlin of NC Storyfest, Inc., one of this year's recipients of a Cultural Partner Grant Investment, shared how art works to build confidence and expand the education of Greensboro's young people. Youth storyteller, Aziza Ward entertained guests with her rendition of the "Rabbit and the Hare." The UAC's investment in NC Storyfest is supporting their Youth Storytelling Collaborative, a program to engage and serve Hispanic/Latino and African American communities in the ancient oral art of storytelling expressed through artistic performance, with an emphasis on civil rights history.

Josephus Thompson III, a local poet and recent Cultural Partner Grant recipient, shared his story of how the UAC's investment in his work has allowed him to continue and grow Reasons 2 Rhyme, a series of free events celebrating the art of poetry while connecting community. Like Gallucci, art works for Josephus, providing for his livelihood and attracting visitors and guest artists to

Greensboro's creative community.

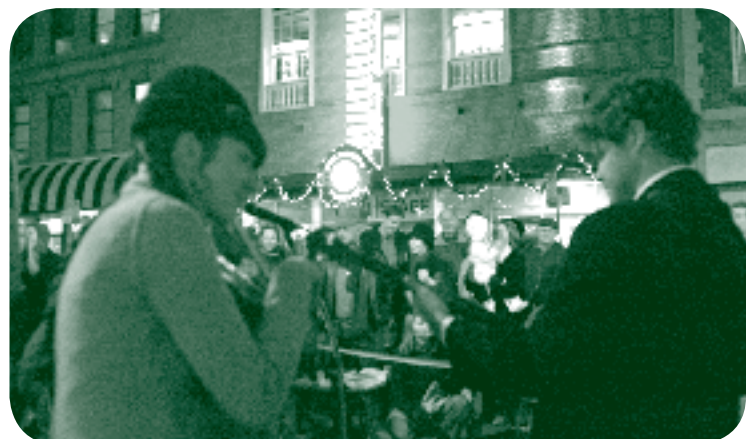

The Coffee Cup Collaborative is a community-based public art project designed to celebrate the unique history of the City of Greensboro and the advancement of the American civil rights movement through the momentous lunch counter sit-ins of 1960. This project reflects the simple request and courage of four NC A&T students who sat at the all-white counter in Greensboro's downtown Woolworth's to ask for a cup of coffee on February 1, 1960. On that Monday afternoon, the sit-in movement began in Greensboro and in the days that followed, spread to 30 cities in 8 states.

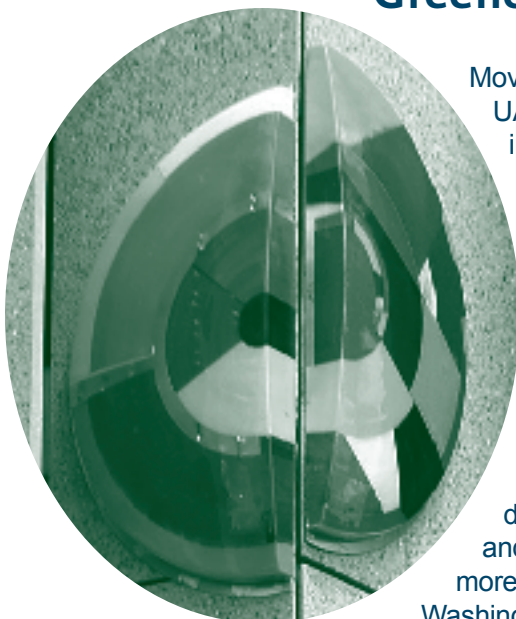
The Coffee Cup Collaborative is a joint effort between the United Arts Council of Greater Greensboro, the International Civil Rights Center and Museum



and Action Greensboro's synerG group to provide a gateway for the public to share and honor those that paved the way for America's desegregation. Each cup is unique, each designed by a different artist and each accompanied by a quote to demonstrate the courage of the Greensboro Four to take a stand and make a difference. 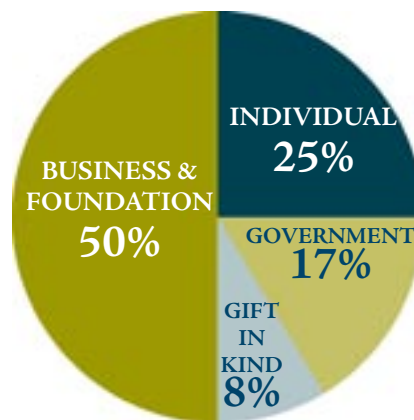

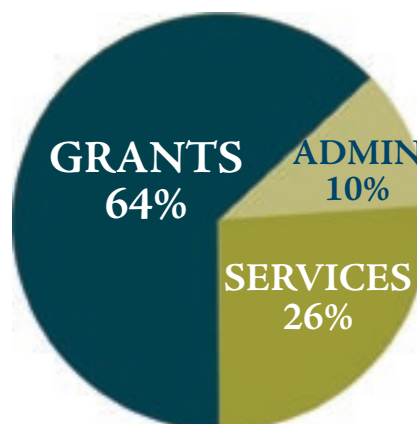
